

Just a friendly reminder with the weather getting warmer, we want to make sure and follow the school dress code.



## • A NOTE FROM OUR NURSE - MEDICATION PICK UP AND • HEALTH CARE PLANS

If your student has medication in our health room, please pick it up after school on June 21st, or the week of June 24th. This is especially important if your student will be moving to another school next fall (including within the Dieringer School District). Medication left after this date may be disposed of. Students with potentially life-threatening conditions MUST have their medications at school while attending, so those medications must stay at school until after the student is dismissed for the summer.

#### Recommended Vaccinations for School Aged Children

#### Dear Parents:

Schools in Washington must make information available on Meningococcal and Human Papilloma Virus diseases to parents and guardians of all students entering Grades 6-12. The following vaccinations are recommended by the Washington State Department of Health. These vaccinations are not required for school attendance, but are recommended to prevent the spread of disease:

Meningococcal Disease - This is an infection of the brain and spinal cord. Healthy teens should get one dose of meningococcal vaccine at age 11 through 12 years. Teens who did not get their first dose at that time should get a dose as soon as possible. A second dose is recommended at age 16. Meningococcal disease spreads by direct contact with infected persons by coughing, kissing, or sharing anything by mouth, such as water bottles, eating utensils, lipsticks, or toothbrushes. It can cause pneumonia, bloodstream infection, and meningitis (swelling of the covering of the brain and spinal cord). Fortunately, this life-threatening infection is rare; only about 20-30 cases are reported each year in Washington State. However, even if treated, 10 to 12 percent of people who get it will die from it. Of the survivors, about 11 to 19 percent have complications such as loss of limbs, deafness, nervous system problems, or brain damage. Adolescents and young adults

are more likely to get meningococcal disease, especially if they live in group settings, like college dorms.

<u>Human Papilloma Virus</u> - HPV vaccine is cancer prevention. It provides long lasting protection against the most common cancers caused by HPV. The HPV vaccine is most effective at this age because it produces the most infection-fighting cells, or antibodies, during the preteen years. The HPV vaccine is recommended for all students age 11-12 years and is licensed for all people ages 9-26 years.

<u>Influenza (Flu) Vaccine</u> -recommended each year for all people ages 6 months and older. The flu is contagious before any symptoms appear, so vaccination has the potential to greatly reduce severe illness resulting in hospitalizations and death. Influenza kills approximately 36,000 people per year in the United States.

Please talk with your health care provider about these immunizations so you can make an informed decision for your children.
